Addressing inequalities in Dudley borough in 2023

Working with the Voluntary, Community, and Enterprise Sector (VCSE) in 2023, the NHS Integrated Care Board started to address health inequalities and raise awareness of cancer and cancer screening in Dudley borough and beyond and with the support of the VCSE successful engagement has been undertaken with the following communities:

- Men only and women only groups with mixed ethnicities
- Black and Afro Caribbean Ladies
- Mental Health lets chat groups
- Deaf Community
- Iris Project Sex Workers
- Sheltered Housing
- Sessions in the deprived areas
- Romany and Gypsy traveller
- Refugee and Migrants



Further to the above work, awareness sessions and supported engagement work within GP Surgeries was also carried out and by December 2023, awareness was raised in over 60 settings/groups with total contacts and conversations reaching over 1300 people. Moving forward the work is set to continue with focus being on raising awareness with homeless people, people with visual impairment, people with Learning Disabilities and those from the LGBTQ+ community.

Furthermore, from February 2024 the following areas will be hosting a cancer tour bus to continue to raise awareness to all members of the community:

Moderna-Merck vaccine cuts odds of skin cancer recurrence in half, study finds.

A vaccine shows promising results in treating the most deadly form of skin cancer, Moderna and Merck recently announced. Those with severe melanomas who received the vaccine alongside Merck's cancer drug Keytruda, were 49% less likely to die or have their cancer come back after three years than those who were given only Keytruda, the biotech companies said in a recent news release. Their findings are based on an ongoing randomised trial involving 157 patients with high-risk stage III/IV melanoma who first had surgery to completely remove cancerous growths. Patients received one milligram of the mRNA vaccine every three weeks for nine doses, and 200 milligrams of Keytruda every three weeks for about a year versus Keytruda alone for approximately a year. Further trials and work are planned for 2024 and 2025.

Can a capsule sponge change how we diagnose oesophageal cancer?

The BEST4 trial, which started this week, will show if a capsule sponge ('pill-on-a-thread') test can be used to monitor people at high risk of oesophageal cancer. Ultimately, this could give the NHS a quick and simple way to screen for the disease and according to researchers, it would save thousands of lives every year.

Funded trials have shown that the capsule sponge test is safe and accurate.

After being piloted for people on endoscopy waiting lists in parts of England, Scotland and Northern Ireland, trials have shown that the capsule sponge test is safe and accurate and if the BEST4 trial is successful, the capsule sponge could become part of a national screening programme across the NHS, in the same way mammograms are used to screen for breast cancer.

NHS to put warnings about cancer symptoms on urinal mats in pubs and football grounds.

The message "Blood in your pee? Contact your GP practice" will appear on mats as a way of urging men to seek help for the major symptom of bladder, kidney, and prostate cancer. Pubs, restaurants, shops, hotels, and sports stadiums will be among the public places using the mats, and men's workplaces will also be targeted.

Cancer News - latest results in England up to November 2023

According to Michelle Mitchell, Cancer Research UK's Chief Executive, every cancer wait time target in England has been missed and as a result thousands of cancer patients across the country face a more anxious and uncertain time. Despite the best efforts of NHS staff, many people are now waiting longer than they should to be diagnosed and treated. The last time all targets for cancer waiting times were met was as far back as 2015.

As stated by Ms Mitchell, "its vital that the UK Government delivers additional investment in NHS staff and diagnostic equipment, coupled with reform to cancer services. Without this, targets will continue to be missed, and patients will not receive the level of care that they deserve."

NHS cancer bus tours country as over two in five wouldn't visit GP about possible symptom

An NHS double-decker bus is touring parts of the country from Monday to raise awareness of the signs and symptoms of cancer and urge people to visit their GP for potentially lifesaving checks if they notice something unusual. The NHS cancer 'bus-ting' tour, in partnership with Stagecoach, comes as new survey data found that more than two in five people wouldn't make a GP appointment if they noticed a change they thought could be cancer. The survey of 2,000 adults also found a quarter would wait to see if a potential symptom gets better on its own or ignore it and hope it goes away. The giant blue bus is branded with striking messages to remind people that catching cancer earlier makes it more treatable, highlighting that of the 78 passengers that the bus can carry, 65 would survive cancer if found at the earliest stage. Teams of local NHS staff, charity workers and cancer survivors will be on board to share their expertise, provide expert advice to passers-by and help answer questions, discuss any worries, and get people directed to the right place. The bus really is a reminder that if you or anyone you know has any concerns or suspicions then always contact vour GP.

Appendiceal Cancer cause and risk factors.

Generally viewed as a rare form of cancer but appendix cancer starts when healthy cells in you're appendix mutate, grow out of control and form a tumour, but it is not certain what causes that process to begin however, there are risk factors associated with the cancer including:

- Age it's more common in people 50 and over.
- Gender women are more likely than men to develop it.
- Medical history certain health conditions may increase your risk.
- Smoking tobacco use can increase your risk of all cancers.

Symptoms of appendix cancer may include:

- Acute appendicitis: Most cases of appendix cancer are discovered during surgery for appendicitis.
- Increase in abdomen size/girth, bloating.
- Vague abdominal discomfort in the lower right abdomen.
- Pelvic discomfort.
- New hernias.
- Bowel obstruction.
- Changes in bowel habits.
- Ovarian masses.

April is bowel cancer awareness month, and this provides a fantastic opportunity to raise awareness of the disease as it is the fourth most common cancer in the UK with over 42,000 people being diagnosed every year. The symptoms of bowel cancer can include:


- Bleeding from your bottom and/or blood in your poo
- A persistent and unexplained change in bowel habit
- Unexplained weight loss
- Extreme tiredness for no obvious reason
- A pain or lump in your tummy

As with any cancer early detection is key and if you have any concerns you should visit your GP. Bowel Cancer UK are a fantastic organisation that provide information and support to those affected by bowel cancer and work tirelessly to raise awareness. Ovarian Cancer Awareness

March is Ovarian cancer awareness month. With 7470 cases diagnosed between 2014-2016, resulting in 4116 deaths in 2017 and with a survival rate of 35% for 10 years it is often known as 'the silent killer' as the symptoms can easily be dismissed. It is worth noting that unlike cervical, bowel and breast cancers, there is still no reliable, effective screening method for ovarian cancer. Symptoms may include:

- · Persistent stomach pain
- · Persistent bloating
- · Difficulty eating/feeling full more quickly
- · Needing to wee more frequently
- · Back pain
- · Changes in bowel habit
- · Tiredness


